






# Migratory Context and Covid-19 (Needs Assessment)

- 1) Active migratory flows, despite COVID19:
  - From South to North:
    - International Migrants
    - Internally Displaced People
  - From North to South:
    - o Returnees
    - Migrants under Title 42
  - From East to West and West to East:
    - Agricultural laborers
    - International Migrants





Blue: International and Internal Migrants, IDP's

**Red:** Mexican Returnees and International Migrants under Title 42

Green: Internal migrants and International Migrants (Agricultural Laborers)

# 2) Double vulnerability of migrants living in these cities:

- Migrants on informal jobs and services sector:
  - Activities were suspended.
  - Not able to cover their rent payments.

#### Larger demand of temporary shelter

- Forced to be in constant movement:
  - Renewal of legal documents


Higher probability of contagion

- Shelters reduced their occupation to 20-50%.
- Shelters closed their doors and denied access to migrants arriving to these cities.
- Lack of protocols, equipment and resources to address Covid.-19 challenges.



### Filter Hotels (IOM's Response)


- 1) People referred to shelters don't have Covid-19.
- 2) Isolation period of 14 days.
- 3) Medical staff treat preexisting conditions (comorbidities).
- 4) Identification of **needs** and reference to partners (legal, psychological, GBV, etc.)



### Challenges

- Community concerns due to prejudice associated with migrant people and Covid-19
- Lack of shelters to refer migrants to after their quarantine
- Special needs of psychiatric attention and lack of mechanisms and service providers.
- Ensuring continued support from partners and relevant stakeholders
- Uncertainty about next steps after closing the Temporary quarantine facilities.
