



## GREATER EQUATORIA (CENTRAL, EASTERN, AND WESTERN EQUATORIA)

**General Situation:** Substantial influx of new arrivals at IDP camps, particularly Camp 1, Camp 3, and Don-Bosco IDP camp reported. Since March 13, 2025, new arrivals in five IDP sites in Juba town have totaled 9,594. CCCM Cluster partners and UNMISS continue to update contingency plans for displaced populations. Water, shelter and healthcare services were listed as the main humanitarian needs in the sites.

### Key Updates:

- **Lack of Humanitarian Services:** The camps lack essential services such as water, shelter materials, and health services. The public water pipeline is not operational, and shelter materials are old and damaged, leaving the newly arrived population vulnerable.
- **Cholera Cases:** Cholera cases were recorded at Mangalla PHCC and Buckeye clinic in Mangalla IDP Camp, prompting health interventions. The Ministry of Health has quickly responded by launching the second phase of the cholera oral vaccination campaign to curb the outbreak.

## JONGLEI STATE AND GPAA

### Key Updates:

- **Coordination Meetings:** Weekly coordination meetings have been initiated in Bor IDP camp to track the movement of new arrivals and address challenges faced by IDP residents. These meetings involve camp chairmen, RRC Bor county coordinators, and protection desk teams. The aim is to strengthen coordination in tracking the movement of new arrivals and those exiting the camp.
- **Flood Mitigation:** IOM CCCM has started installing 60 new metallic culverts in Bor IDP camp to mitigate flooding. Tools such as spades, wheelbarrows, peak axes, gumboots, rubber gloves, and rakes have been donated for cleaning the drainage system in preparation for the rainy season. The installation of culverts was carried out using excavators with support from casual workers in the site.
- **Dyke Repairs:** UNHCR has engaged stakeholders in community mobilization for dyke repairs in New Fangak as part of flood mitigation efforts. This initiative aims to prepare for the rainy season by repairing dykes to prevent flooding.

## UNITY STATE

### Key Updates:

- **Dyke Rehabilitation:** Community-led dyke rehabilitation efforts are planned for April 2025 to address flooding in Leer, Panyijiar, and Mayendit counties. The local authority will lead the mobilization for these efforts, with support from site management committees. This initiative aims to repair key dykes that have been damaged again after previous rehabilitation efforts.
- **Community-Led Projects:** The Danish Refugee Council (DRC), in partnership with UNHCR, conducted consultation meetings for community-led projects. These meetings aimed to bring together community groups to identify and prioritize key issues affecting them, while collaboratively seeking solutions with an emphasis on community empowerment, sustainability, resilience, and inclusivity. The community representatives identified access to firewood as a major challenge and suggested the provision of canoes as the best solution.
- **Service Monitoring:** DRC continued to monitor services across Bentiu IDP sites, addressing issues such as inconsistent water supply and the need for latrine desludging. These issues have been flagged to IOM WASH for immediate action. The ongoing monitoring aims to ensure that the services provided meet the needs of the displaced population effectively.
- **Road Grading:** IOM camp management has been grading and compacting roads in Bentiu, with 17 km of roads graded. Raising the road and installation of culverts have also commenced. This effort aims to improve access and service delivery in Bentiu town and the IDP camp.
- **Youth Engagement:** CCCM provided youth engagement activities at the Youth Center in Bentiu IDP Camp, with over 279 youth participating in indoor games. Additionally, human-centered design training was provided to 50 women block leaders to foster participatory community engagement. The training will also be extended to youth members in the coming month.

## WESTERN BAHR EL GHAZAL, NORTHERN BAHR EL GHAZAL, WARRAP, AND ABYEI

### Key Updates:

- **Consultation Meetings:** IOM CCCM coordinated consultation meetings regarding the signing of lease documents following the plot allotment exercise. These meetings were supported by the state Ministry of Housing, Land, and Public Utility, along with HLP, Protection, and CCCM. The community expressed their happiness during the plot showing activities, indicating a positive reception to the process.
- **Community Awareness Campaigns:** Awareness campaigns on open defecation, garbage collection, and shelter maintenance and hygiene were conducted by community leaders. These campaigns used door-to-door messaging to target the population in Hai Masna and Naivasha IDP sites in Wau. The aim was to improve hygiene practices and sanitation within the community.

## UPPER NILE STATE

### Key Updates:

- **Joint Assessment:** Partners in Nasir, in collaboration with the County's Relief and Rehabilitation Commission (RRC), conducted a joint assessment to evaluate the needs of IDPs in 18 displaced sites hosting 29,232 individuals. The assessment identified increased needs for health, WASH, education, protection, emergency shelter, and NFIs. The findings indicated a dire need for access to basic services among the displaced population.
- **Border Monitoring:** A total of 1,200 individuals returned to South Sudan, and 9,600 individuals departed to Ethiopia during the reporting month. Border monitoring aims to track the inflow and outflow of individuals to understand population movements.
- **Onward Transportation Assistance (OTA):** 2,286 returnees received assistance with onward transportation to various locations in South Sudan. This assistance is crucial to facilitate the movement of returnees to their final destinations.
- **Road Renovation:** Renovation of roads and drainage systems within the POC, including significant backfilling and leveling activities, has been ongoing. The cleaning and maintenance of various drainage systems aim to improve water flow during the rainy season.
- **Community Engagement:** DRC facilitated meetings between humanitarian partners and community leaders to discuss distribution and sanitation initiatives. These efforts aim to enhance living conditions for residents by improving sanitation facilities and ensuring effective service delivery.
