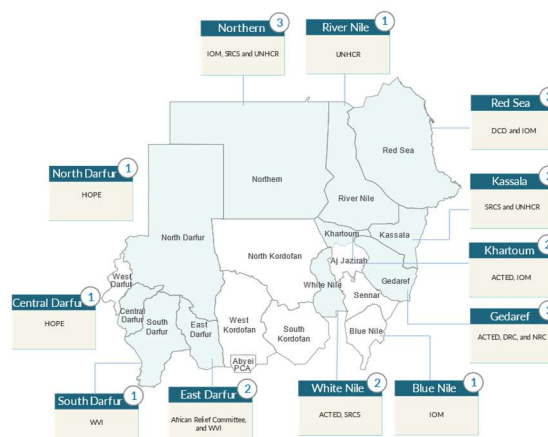


Context Highlights

- As of April 2025, over **406,000 IDPs** were forcibly displaced from Zamzam IDP Camp in North Darfur. Most remain unassisted across 19 localities, with **Tawila and El Fasher overwhelmed** by the influx. The Zamzam IDP site is non-functional, and **humanitarian access remains highly constrained**.
- In **North Darfur**, the cluster engaged partners to consider scaling up in response to Zamzam displacement—while **readiness was noted, funding remains a gap**. The national Site Management Coordination (SMC) team contributed to the Tawila Draft Response Plan. **DRC** is active in Golo, and **NRC** is preparing to respond in Tawila.
- Ongoing conflict and economic collapse** continue to drive mass internal displacement, especially in Khartoum, Kordofan, and Darfur, straining both camp and out-of-camp site capacities.
- Since January 2025, the Site Management Cluster has reached over 231,000 individuals, including 18,815 people in April alone, through a range of interventions addressing site coordination, infrastructure rehabilitation, information dissemination, and referrals. This scale-up reflects the cluster's expanding operational footprint and responsiveness to dynamic displacement patterns.

Progress Towards 2025 HNRP Strategic Objectives

Objective 1: Strengthen Access to Multi-Sectoral Services

- Khartoum (Omdurman):** IOM conducted assessments at Omdurman Technical School, sheltering 300 IDPs in heavily damaged classrooms due to conflict. The RRF team, through Medair, plans to **rehabilitate the structure and restore WASH facilities**, enhancing access to dignified shelter and basic services.
- White Nile (Kosti & Rabak):** Caritas Sudan provided **cash assistance to 1,500 households** across three displacement sites. Notably, **300 HHs in Al Sedra Camp (Goz Alslaam), 400 HHs in Al Kawa, and 800 HHs in Ali Mohamed Nour camp** received support, bolstering financial access to goods and services.

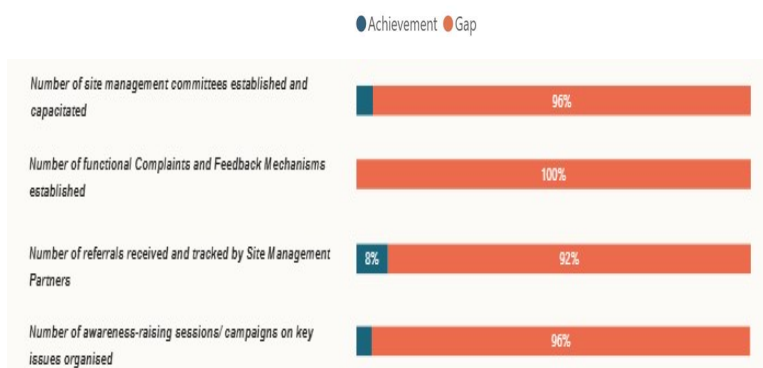
• Gedaref:

- **Shelter/NFI Concerns:** DRC reported storm-related damage impacting 50 HHs in Kassab and Jenan.
- **Water Coordination:** DRC initiated a resource transfer of an underutilized bladder from Gadmbilia to Um Golja.
- **Hygiene Support:** *DRC finalized and distributed hygiene kits to 1,369 households across 54 sites*, enhancing WASH service coverage in **Wasat Al Gedaref, Western Gallabat, and Al Fashaga** localities.

Objective 2: Enhance Community Resilience

Gedaref:

- **NRC** partnered with local authorities to form **community action plan committees** in Almatar and Alabbasia under the urban response strategy.
- **DRC** operated a **complaints desk during Emergency Shelter Kit (ESK) distribution in Abo Alnaja**, resolving 38 grievances.
- **Sanitation Improvements:** *DRC dislodged a total of 16 latrines in Um Golja and Dalest*

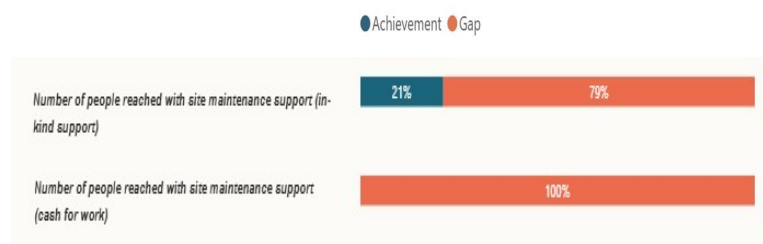


Alarrkens villages in Gedaref State, benefiting 729 individuals. This intervention improved sanitation conditions and contributed to reducing public health risks in these displacement-affected communities.

- DRC co-chaired monthly **IDP coordination meetings** with authorities and partners, identifying gaps in shelter, WASH, and protection across DRC covered IDP sites.
- On 14 April, UNHCR visited **Alkarama** and the **Agricultural Research IDP site**, holding meetings with site management committees, IDP representatives, and partner agencies. Key issues discussed included the **current situation of IDPs** and **voluntary return prospects**.

Objective 3: Improve Site Protection

- **Gedaref:** DRC referred **eight at-risk households** facing eviction due to school reopening to **IOM** for relocation, in line with advocacy for secure tenure and dignity in displacement.
- **Khartoum (Bahri):** **IOM** and **Blue Sky** conducted site assessments in Shambat, Helat

Hamad, and others. **1,000 HHs received NFIs**, but unmet needs remain high, with coverage reaching only **60% of the identified caseload** due to stock limitations.

- **White Nile (Kosti):** According to the latest update from **HAC**, the Government **evicted Omama Bint Alharith School** to resume educational activities. The **technical committee relocated 30 IDP families** from the school to **Goz Al Salam camp**, using **25 newly erected tents**. This relocation brings the **total number of evicted schools in Kosti locality to 28**, and **1,273 HHs (4,500 individuals)** have now been relocated since the beginning of school-based site transitions.

Challenges

- **White Nile:** Limited access to banking and identity documents delays **cash disbursements** and causes **grouping errors**, impeding financial inclusion for IDPs.
- **Khartoum:** Ongoing conflict continues to **drive new arrivals of returnees**, straining service delivery and shelter capacities across formal and informal gathering sites.



DRC CCCM team, in coordination with the Rural Wasat Al Gedaref locality IDPs unit, facilitated and co-chaired the monthly locality-level coordination meeting.



IOM through its implementing partner Blue Sky, distributed NFIs kits targeting IDPs, Returnees and Host community within Shambat, Helat Hamad, Helat Khojali, and Aldyoum areas.
