Key updates from the Sector - Operational updates from the partners	<ul> <li>CCCM has been activated in Damascus with support extended to Aleppo and Qamishli hubs, focal points in Homs, and a remote mechanism for Deir-ez-Zor; an IM presence will also be based in Damascus to coordinate closely with the IM unit.</li> </ul>	
	The transition process to harmonize tools in Gaziantep and Qamishli is ongoing and expected to conclude by the end of June.	
	<ul> <li>Two NGOs, IOM and ACTED, will receive ECHO funding for CCCM activities, while SHF funding will soon be raised to support ACTED and REACH in response to reduced USAID support;</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>partners are encouraged to establish a presence in Syria and obtain necessary licenses to access funding opportunities.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>A field mission to Al-Hayat camp in Al-Bab was conducted on 28 April following a complaint submitted via OCHA regarding deteriorating health conditions and a desire among IDPs to return to their areas of origin (Aqirbat and Deir Hafer) rather than be relocated.</li> </ul>	
Partners programmatic and operational shifting beyond June 2025	• Muzun is actively monitoring return movements from IDP sites and regularly shares updates with CCCM. While return movements have declined recently, they are expected to increase at the end of the school year. A recent return convoy was privately funded, and Muzun visited the area of origin where significant destruction was observed. Some families returned with their tents due to their homes being fully demolished. The primary push factor for return appears to be the suspension of WASH services in camps.	The CCCM team in Aleppo plans to organize a workshop for field staff on this topic and will coordinate closely with Civil Defense. Muzun has previously conducted mine risk awareness sessions for IDPs.
	<ul> <li>Organizations operating in the field have emphasized the need for coordination with Civil Defense to address war remnants. UNHCR's Aleppo office conducted a Training of Trainers (ToT) session on war remnants awareness through Um MASS to prepare humanitarian workers.</li> </ul>	

IDPs Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix (ISIMM) Update	<ul> <li>As of March 2025, the CCCM database includes 1,671 IDP sites that host 1,979,817 Individuals/371,841 Households. Of these, 79% are women and children, and 73,588 IDPs are reported to be persons with disabilities. In March, 26 sites were deactivated due to site mergers and closures resulting from IDPs returning to their areas of origin following recent developments (see attached). This movement resulted in a reduction of 120,427 IDPs across the sites compare to February update.</li> <li>The CCCM Cluster extends its gratitude to the organizations that contributed to this update: Muzun, ACTED, SR, MSF, ACU, ATAA, White Hands, GN, HIHFAD, SDI, SECD, SI, TAS, Watan, Care, Binaa, HA, and Shafak.</li> </ul>	
IDPs Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix Plus (ISIMM+)	<ul> <li>A new round of ISIMM Plus will be conducted between May and June 2025, covering all IDP sites across Syria.</li> <li>Data collection is scheduled to take place from 13 May to 3 June 2025.</li> <li>The final output is expected to be shared by the end of June 2025.</li> </ul>	CCCM will send an email to cluster membres to gather their coverage plans for IDP sites.
Return Movements	<ul> <li>333,081 IDPs (63,301 families) returned from the IDP sites since 8th December 2024</li> <li>98,672 IDPs departed from IDP sites in Aleppo.</li> <li>234,409 IDPs departed from IDP sites in Idleb.</li> <li>Majority of returns since 8 December 2025 by single families or male adults returning for family reunifications or to assess their homes.</li> <li>98 % of returns are permanent.</li> <li>64.7 % of returning IDPs have returned to there are of origin districts.</li> </ul>	
Displacement Movements	Data was collected from 937 accessible communities across Northwest Syria in April 2025 through 1,872 Kls. The data is covering the period from January to March 2025. In the fourth quarter over 6,800 people were displaced in Idleb and Aleppo, particularly from Dana, Afrin, Maaret Tamsrin, and Sharan due to loss of income, loss of assets, inadequate access to shelter housing, inadequate access to work or livelihoods. Majority of the affected	

	population arrived to Sarmin, Atareb, and Dana sub-districts.	
Incidents Update	Incidents March 2025 Update: A total of 30 incidents were reported in IDP sites, the majority of which were fire-related (28 incidents), along with 2 wind-related incidents. These incidents affected 29 IDP sites, resulting in injuries to two individuals and damage to 35 tents.	
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
