Key updates from the Sector - Operational updates from the partners	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Site Visits with Donors: CCCM conducted multiple site visits with donors, including a key visit to Marrit Al Numan with ECHO. The area was prioritized due to intention surveys showing high potential return of IDPs. The visit included stops at the national hospital, proposed location of wastewater treatment plant, industry school, and meetings with the local council and families to assess service needs for returns. • "Fire Belt" Areas: The previously conflict-affected areas (referred to as the "fire belt") are the original homes of nearly 70% of IDPs in camps. These areas require significant support to enable safe returns. • Funding for NES: Due to funding cuts, several camps in NES faced service gaps. A new allocation of \$450,000 has been granted to ACTED for CCCM activities over 9 months to fill these gaps. • Upcoming Allocations (SCHF/SHF): CCCM priorities include responding to sudden displacements and maintaining existing camps. Planned activities include constructing fire point rooms, training IDPs in fire safety, forming camp committees, and Skills Enhancement. • Meeting in Idleb (26 May): A meeting at HAC office with NGOs and camp managers highlighted major challenges including unstable return patterns, lack of services in areas of origin, and increasing camp populations. Continued support for WASH and food services was emphasized, with suggestions to explore cash assistance for returnees. • Qamishli Coordination: Weekly meetings with camp managers continue to monitor needs and identify service gaps. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CCCM Will Share the report of the meeting with HAC conducted on 26 May with the cluster members
Partners update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Muzun: Field teams reported urgent needs for waste removal in camps due to rising health concerns ahead of summer. • Al Hol Returns: 49 families, all with medical cases, are scheduled to return from Al Hol camp to Aleppo. • Global Communities: GC has ceased protection activities in Atmeh. While GC in partnership with IYD continues to implement WASH activities in the camps. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The CCCM will raise the issue of the camp remains with the local government.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ACTED: Currently covering 11 camps in Aleppo and Idlib, providing coordination, cash-for-work, and protection services. • Closed Camps on Agricultural Land: There are concerns about the remnants of recently closed camps, particularly those located on agricultural land. A solution is needed for proper clearance and land restoration. 	
IDPs Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix (ISIMM) Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • As of April 2025, the CCCM database includes 1,845 IDP sites that host 1,883,387 Individuals/344,962 Households. Of these, 79% are women and children, and 65,5884 IDPs are reported to be persons with disabilities. In April, 25 sites were deactivated due to site mergers and closures resulting from IDPs returning to their areas of origin following recent developments (see attached). This movement resulted in a reduction of 96,430 IDPs across the sites compare to March update 	
IDPs Sites Integrated Monitoring Matrix Plus (ISIMM+)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ISIMM Data Collection: CCCM has launched a new round of data collection with support from 13 organizations (ACTED, ACU, Muzun, TAS, Shafak, ATAA, Solidarites, SDI, SECD, Global Communities/IYD, Binaa, Human Appeal, and Watan). Data collection is expected to be completed by 6 June. • NES Coverage Gap: There remains a coverage gap in camps located in NES. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> •
Return Movements	<p>Returns from Camps: A total of 459,282 IDPs (85,676 families) have returned from camps — 119,980 from Aleppo and 339,302 from Idlib.</p> <p>Departure Details:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Aleppo: 119,980 IDPs departed from IDP sites. • Idlib: 339,302 IDPs departed from IDP sites. <p>Return Trends:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Most returns since 8 December 2025 have been by single individuals or male heads of households, often for family reunification or to assess housing conditions. • 98% of the returns are considered permanent. • 99.8% of returnees have returned to their district of origin. 	
Incidents Update	<p>Incident Report April :</p> <p>A total of 26 incidents were reported in IDP sites during April, including 21 fire outbreaks, 4 floods,</p>	

	and 1 wind-related event . These incidents affected 24 IDP sites , resulting in damage to 49 tents and one reported death .	
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
