

JUNE 2025





GREATER EQUATORIA (CENTRAL, EASTERN, AND WESTERN EQUATORIA)

- Mangalla Site Visit (June 3): IDP leaders highlighted a critical lack of seeds and agricultural tools. This shortage is especially concerning during the rainy season, as it threatens food security and self-reliance among displaced populations who depend on farming.
- **Displacement in Morobo County:** Armed clashes between government and opposition forces displaced over 18,732 individuals. Many fled to Uganda, while others settled in local areas like Injirima, Degi, and Marakaji. Humanitarian partners are responding, but resources are limited.
- **Health Services in Juba IDP Camps:** MSF ended its health support in Camps 1 and 3 on May 30. Only a maternity care facility run by IMC remains, operating with limited capacity. The absence of police and government presence has hindered responses to SGBV, with three serious cases reported in two months.
- **Flood Preparedness in Mangalla:** Local authorities and health workers initiated flood awareness campaigns due to the 2024 flood legacy. Cholera outbreaks and drug shortages at Buckeye Health Clinic remain a concern.
- **DRC Headcounts and Service Mapping:** DRC conducted population headcounts in five IDP-hosting areas and established community feedback desks. This helps identify protection cases and improve coordination.
- **NRC Interventions:** NRC registered 1,950 households for multipurpose cash assistance and S/NFI kits. It also mapped health and nutrition facilities in Morobo Payams, launched PSS activities in four centers, and began legal documentation training for stakeholders.

JONGLEI STATE AND GPAA

- Fangak County Displacement: Aerial bombardments since May, including strikes on the Old Fangak MSF Hospital, forced mass displacement to safer areas like Paguir and Toch. These locations are now humanitarian hubs due to their accessibility and relative safety.
- **ERRM Multi-Sector Needs Assessment:** Conducted from June 19 to July 2, this assessment helped identify urgent humanitarian gaps in shelter, food, WASH, and protection.
- Population Headcount: DRC counted 1,380 households (12,314 individuals) in Paguir, providing critical data for aid planning.
- Coordination and Mapping: Emergency meetings and partner service mapping were conducted to streamline aid delivery and identify overlaps or gaps.
- **GBV and Hygiene Support:** ACF trained 200 women on fuel-efficient cooking to reduce GBV risks during firewood collection. AIRD distributed 450 dignity kits and supported a GBV center in Paguir. CAO and ADA conducted hygiene promotion and distributed soap and Aqua tabs.
- **Shelter Damage in Bor:** Heavy rains in June destroyed many shelters in Bor IDP camp (Ex-PoC). The last S/NFI distribution was in 2022, leaving shelters vulnerable to weather damage.

UNITY STATE

- **Security and Displacement:** Aerial bombardments in Panyijiar County and intercommunal violence displaced over 31,200 people. The situation remains volatile, especially near the Lakes State border.
- **Community Engagement:** CCCM facilitated meetings with IDP leaders and local authorities to address cholera, flooding, and theft. In Rotriak, discussions led to proposals for a new police post and community watch groups to curb cattle raids and theft.
- Accountability: UNHCR and DRC's Complaint and Feedback Mechanism recorded 362 cases, with 189 referred to service providers.
- Support to Returnees: DRC verified 71 vulnerable returnees in Rotriak for emergency shelter support.
- Camp Management Transition: Burial services were handed over to County Solidarity. Concerns were raised about transportation and graveyard access.
- **Health Services:** Only the IOM clinic in Sector 3 is fully functional. Other clinics lack drugs and refer patients to S3, creating a bottleneck.
- Flood Mitigation: 210 meters of dike were rehabilitated. 970 meters of drains were cleared. 21.6 million liters of stormwater were pumped from retention basins.

WESTERN BAHR EL GHAZAL, NORTHERN BAHR EL GHAZAL, WARRAP, AND ABYEI

- Durable Solutions Coordination: IOM CCCM facilitated a multi-stakeholder meeting involving the DSIC, IDP leaders, RRC, and Shelter teams. The focus was on scaling up shelter construction and improving site development in Khor Malang.
- Open Defecation Awareness: Due to deteriorating WASH infrastructure, community leaders used megaphones to educate residents on the dangers of open defecation. The campaign aims to prevent disease outbreaks during the rainy season.
- Drainage and Shelter Protection: CCCM and RRC encouraged IDPs to dig small drainage channels around shelters to prevent water stagnation. This helps protect homes and reduce mosquito breeding, lowering the risk of malaria.

UPPER NILE STATE

- Security and Displacement: The situation is calm but unpredictable. Small groups of IDPs continue arriving in Malakal and Bulukat due to insecurity across the River Sobat.
- Infrastructure Improvements: 9,130 meters of roads were graded in PoC and Hai Matar. 705 meters of drainage were cleaned, and 4 culverts were installed. One kilometer of dike was rehabilitated to prevent flooding.
- Waste Management: Over 12 trips of garbage were removed. Seven cubic meters of trash were collected in Sector 7.
- Bulukat TC Activities: 139 households used telecom services to contact relatives. Five awareness sessions reached 674 people on hygiene and safety. Shelter repairs and drainage cleaning were conducted to improve living conditions.
- **Health Advocacy:** The only health partner in Bulukat TC may lose funding by August, threatening service continuity.
